Microarrays - Maths and Biology converging

Very interested in Maths — and Biology getting together so went to a fasciniting talk today. Studying cell processes with microarrays can lead to many variation in results and difficulties in reproducing the results.

There are different ways of stopping the cycle of a cell but these are not exact; nor does the cell immediately start again when allowed to or just continue as if nothing has happened.

Statistical techniques are required to analyse the huge amounts of data being generated and to reduce the amount of "noice".

It is all a long way from the commercial world but it is wonderful to see science in action. The paper on this work has yet to be published.

The talk was by Wally Gilks . The abstract was "It is widely acknowledged that microarray data are subject to high noise levels and results are often platform dependent. Therefore, microarray experiments should be replicated several times and in several laboratories before results can be relied upon. To make best use of such extensive datasets, methods for microarray data fusion are required. Ideally, the fused data should distil important aspects of the data whilst suppressing unwanted sources of variation, and be amenable to further informal and formal methods of analysis. Also, account should be taken of variability in the quality of experimentation.

We present such an approach to data fusion, based on multivariate regression. We apply our methodology to data from Rustici et al. (2004) on cell-cycle control in S. pombe."

After twenty years at the sharp end of the IT world, incluging four start-ups, David Griffiths opted to buy a micro-brewery Fenland $\,$.

Before buying the brewery, he talked to his competitors who were and are still helpful. It was very different raising a £70,000 Small Firms Guarantee Loan for his own venture rather than millions for high tech ventures. He has to find a new cluster.

Decided to build on local customers but some supermarkets are keen to order bottle fermented beer. If so, he will have to up his production facility of "Five Barrel" Brewery in expensive quantum steps.

Helped by reduction in tax paid by the micro breweries (half the large company rate) and also now tax is only due when the beer leaves the premises. Previously paid on production.

Costing difficult as large breweries have larger equipment controlled by same small team as in a micro brewer. It has taken time to find the best suppliers of bottles and labels. Interestingly, women buy over 40% of beer bought in supermarkets. Most local pubs are linked to the main breweries and have to sell house produce.

Best moment so far was when David phoned a supplier to be told that they were too busy and "phone back later!". Very different from the high tech world.

Very much a life style business and he sees much more of his wife and less of planes and hotels.

Simple EF and all kept in the family.

Could not sell out of the unquoted companies in 2000 and lost most of the value of the portfolio with half the companies going bust. The rest are doing well with ANT floated and Wolfson so he is back to break-even.

Could not even remember meeting ANT and had no clear investment strategy. Just pile them up and keep investing. Not too keen on VCs either. Made the usual point that VCs can washout the other investors but that is to be expected in a recession. Also only experienced people should deal with VCs.

He rambled on well over his time. I was left wondering what the Angels in Silicon Valley would make of it all. The Angels in Google played a big part in kick starting the company whereas Richard says he wants nothing to do with the running of the business. There are few high-growth companies in Silicon Valley or Silicon Fen which have not had VC investment.
